The opening words above are the hype created by one of the hotels in Mombasa: the ship-themed Voyager Beach Resort located in the exclusive Nyali suburb.

I had arrived here on a warm Saturday afternoon, hungry and tired. At the gate, a trumpet blast from the gate by his colleague.

For dinner, however, all the "passengers" are requested to leave their sandals, sleeveless shirts and "hot pants" in their respective "cabins" and "dress like ladies and gentlemen".
